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From Our Rector

Summertime again ...

This summer on Wednesday evenings - except for July 15th and August 19th - we will have a barbeque in the back of the parking lot. I will cook burgers and hot dogs, provide potato salad, drinks and fruit – maybe corn on the cob as a change of pace – for a nominal covering costs fee – come enjoy fellowship – eat and don't cook or clean up – it's on me. I know that Summer is a traditionally slow time for Church attendance with vacations and the like – but if you are around come and break bread with each other – invite your friends if you want but this is not an open to the public event – Public events mean public rules – This is not a fund raiser – donations are only to help cover the cost of the food.

As I've mentioned during the announcements the Vestry got together for an offsite meeting this past mid-June. We discussed the shape of the church and the congregation. We are facing lean times, both as a Christ Church Tashua (CCT) community and as a denomination. Here in Connecticut the secular world is far outpacing the religious communities in influence and growth. Many of you miss services on Sundays due to other commitments. In light of this situation we gathered to talk about where we are and to formalize the beginning of a strategic plan initiative. It is important that we, all of us, get a chance to voice where we think and would like our CCT to go. What direction do we want to head in, or do we want to keep the status quo for now and try to sustain. This plan, which we will renew every five years, will guide our decision making process. To facilitate this the vestry members will be leading house meetings in the next couple of months to get your input. We will then meet and draft a plan that we can roll out for comment to the congregation in late fall and vote upon at our next annual meeting.

We will continue to be trying new things around here. The barbeque is an example. The Saturday night services were an example. Some will work and some will not. Saturday night service, for example, was an attempt to make services available for those of you who had conflicts Sunday morning. While initially we had six to ten people attending and over 35 on Apple Festival night, it soon dwindled to one to four and often no one showing up. As a result, the Saturday service will be discontinued at the end of June. We will have one service the weekend of the Apple Festival but we will not be having them on a regular basis any longer. We will, however, be trying something new at the 10 o'clock service. Starting on August 30th and the first Sunday of the month thereafter, the 10 a.m. service will be a children's service. We will have some changes to the liturgy and music during these services and we will be encouraging the young people to play a bigger role in the service. There will be no Sunday school that week. So if you have young ones, come on down. If you can only make a few services, try and make August 30th and then the first Sunday in October, November and December. The first Sunday in October will be blessing of the animals too. We will also have our Back to School Sundae the weekend after Labor Day. Check the website – the calendar should be current.

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Your pledges are needed. Summer is usually a slow period for most churches in the country. With attendance down the weekly pledges drop as well. Many of you stepped up this winter to prepay your pledges when we were hit by unexpected expenses, however our regular expenses keep happening and with attendance down our numbers mean we are really week to week in regards to overhead. Please do whatever you can to help out. We are really down to barebones and while we are fixing things around the church as you'll notice – that money is coming from bequests which specified non-operating expenses – so we can't use them for utilities or payroll. The vestry is looking at how we can invest in capital repairs that will help with our overhead but we are tight right now. Thanks in advance for your support. On that note as I stated in our annual meeting, our goal is to try and stop spending down the endowment as was done in the past and to switch to a self-sustaining percentage that won't affect principal. This means our non-pledge income will stay flat even with the recent bequest from Dottie. As a community we need to be paying our own way from the community we want to be. Please think about that when giving feedback to our strategic plan and during the pledge drive for next year.

As I write this the ECUSA is meeting in its General Convention. We will have a new Presiding Bishop come this fall. Some of you have met Bishop Curry. I am confident he can lead us well during the next nine years and will be a good face for our denomination on the world stage. Please pray for him and for all the church. We are also blessed to continue to have Bishop Ian leading us here in Connecticut. I envision that he will make some changes in the structure of the diocese going forward and while I can't know what those changes will be, I do know that those who plan and look forward should not be surprised by whatever direction we take. I'll do my best to stay in touch and participate in whatever way I can with the diocese and communicate how strong and vibrant, albeit small, our community is.

God bless and keep you all safe this summer during your travels and vacations. Remember when you're in town to come and worship with those of us who love and pray for you. Invite your friends to fellowship with us. We miss you when you aren't here whether you are weekly attendees or monthly attendees. Know you have a spiritual home and we will keep the light of Christ lit to guide you home.

Speaking the Unspeakable, Thinking the Unthinkable

The Charleston shooting affected me and still does. I've been thinking about it since Thursday morning when I heard. My heart goes out to the family and friends affected by that Wednesday's events. I cannot imagine the pain they are still experiencing, and I struggle to understand why someone would do such a thing. The sobering video of Felicia Sanders, Wanda Simmons, and two others forgiving Dylann Storm Roof touched my very core and left me wondering if I could do the same – I believe I have as I pray not only for the families in that community and this country – but also for Dylann Roof and his family. But even more, my thoughts have been directed toward God. Where was he? What was he doing? Why did people who gathered to pray to him die? After conversations with others, Christians and non-Christians alike, here are some conclusions I have reached.

What happened in a church in Charleston, South Carolina on that Wednesday night is a lot of things, but one thing it's not is "unthinkable." Somebody thought long and hard about it. Somebody thought to load the weapon. Somebody thought to pick the church. Somebody thought to sit, quietly, through some of Wednesday night bible study. Somebody thought to stand up and open fire, killing nine people, including the pastor. Somebody reportedly thought to leave one woman alive so she could tell his story to the world. Somebody thought enough to flee. What happened in that church was a lot of things, but *unthinkable* is not one of them.

What happened in that Charleston church on Wednesday night is a lot of things, but one thing it's not is "unspeakable." We should speak of it often. We should speak of it loudly. We should speak of it as terrorism, which is what I believe it was. We should speak of it as racial violence, which is what it was.

We should speak of it as an attack on history, which it was. This was the church founded by Denmark Vesey, who planned a slave revolt in 1822. Vesey was convicted in a secret trial in which many of the witnesses testified after being tortured. After they hung him, a mob burned down the church he built. His sons rebuilt it. On Wednesday night, someone turned it into something other than a house of worship.

We should speak of it as an assault on the idea of a political commonwealth, which is what it was. And we should speak of it as one more example of all of these, another link in a bloody chain of events that reaches all the way back to African wharves and Southern docks. It is not an isolated incident, not if you consider history as something alive that can live and breathe and bleed. We should speak of all these things. What happened in that church was a lot of things, but unspeakable is not one of them. What happened in that church was yet another wakeup call for all people of all faith traditions to take a stand, use their voice and make differences.

Not to think about these things is to betray the dead. Not to speak of these things is to dishonor them. Nikki Haley, the governor of South Carolina, looked out her window at the flag of treason that is flown proudly at her state capitol and thought about these things, and spoke of them, before she expressed herself so puzzled at how something like this could happen in South Carolina, the home office of American sedition – the flag will come down.

Think about what happened. Think about why it happened. Talk about what happened. Talk about why it happened. Do these things, over and over again. The country must resist the temptation present in anesthetic innocence. It must reject the false comfort of learned disbelief and the narcotic embrace of concocted surprise. There is a ferocious underground fire running through American history. It rages unseen until it flares again from the warm earth. It has raged from the death of Denmark Vesey in 1822 to the death of the Reverend and state senator Clementa Pinckney on Wednesday night.

This was not an unspeakable act. Sylvia Johnson, one of only three survivors of the massacre, is speaking out about it.

"She said that he had reloaded five different times... and he just said 'I have to do it'."

There is a timidity that the country can no longer afford. This was not an unthinkable act. A man may have had confusion and hate for a mind, but it was well thought out. It was a cool, considered crime, as well planned as any bank robbery or any computer fraud. If people do not want to speak of it, or think about it, it's because they do not want to follow the story where it inevitably leads. It's because they do not want to follow this crime all the way back to the mother of all American crimes, the one that Denmark Vesey gave his life to avenge. What happened on Wednesday night was a lot of things. A massacre was only one of them.

After conversations with others, Christians and non-Christians alike, the question came up, *Where Was God On Wednesday Night in Charleston, SC?* I feel God was filling Emanuel with his presence, ruling sovereignly from heaven, preserving faith, and working his mysterious will, to the praise of his glorious grace.

I look to each of us to not only think about it but also be willing to speak about it. Not for a moment and move on – not to make each of us comfortable – for to reach a place we are called to be as Christians – the path is not always a comfortable one. As I've said many times – "for me the Church has left the building."

North Carolina Bishop Michael Curry elected as 27th Presiding Bishop



On Saturday June 27, the bishops of The Episcopal Church met in closed session at the Cathedral Church of St. Mark in Salt Lake City, Utah and elected their next presiding bishop, Bishop Michael Curry, on the first ballot. The House of Deputies then voted 800 to 12 to consent to the election. The Presiding Bishop-elect takes office on November 1, 2015.

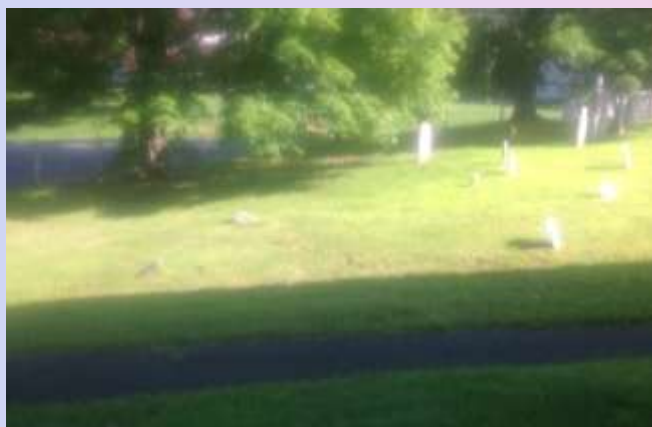

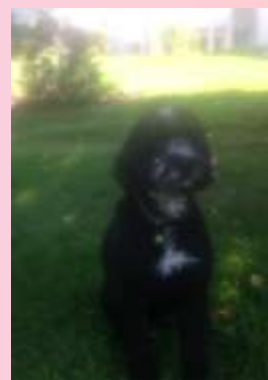
This guy - and his friends - seem to really like our dumpster! He's the second raccoon we've found this year.




This week started the process of replacing the fencing around our church property. Here are some pictures of the progress so far... Come on over and take a look!



Even our furry friend Maggie is checking out our progress!

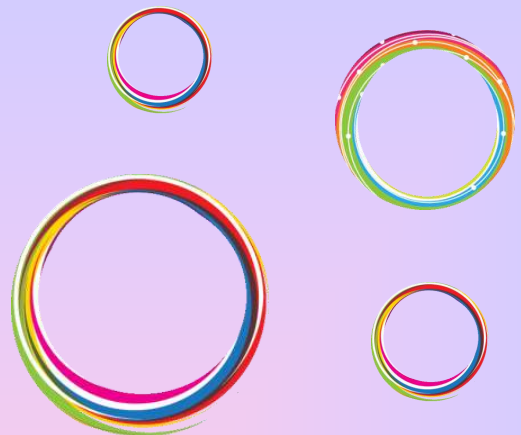

If you are interested in any of these, please let Fr. Rob know or call Maryanne in the Parish Office.

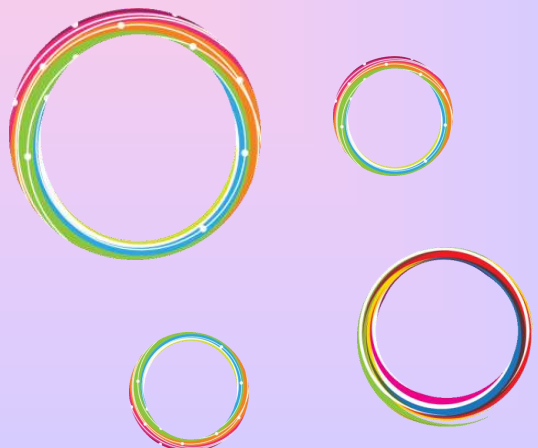
