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From Our Rector

Summer flew by didn't it? This summer we had our weekly barbeques which sure felt fun. For all but two of the weeks, a differing group of about 10 to 20 of us met either in the parking lot or on the grass to fellowship and eat. I had a great time cooking and it seems many had a good time not cooking. The weather held out on Wednesday nights thankfully and I think we'll do it again next year.

This summer saw the fence in front of the Church get replaced and it looks great. Some of your fellow parishioners took some of the good slats and replaced the broken or missing ones to the remainder of the fence along Tashua Road. Now if we can get a white washing party this fall for the remaining section we'll be in great shape.

We started a Youth Group this Summer as well – Trinity Trumbull and us finally got it together after an fitful start on Father's Day. We had 12 young people the third week in August and several of them were not members of either congregation. We had a great time and good job doing outreach you guys. For those of you who were away this Summer, come join us. The next get together will be in October. If you have youngsters 10 and up through High School age, join us.

There are some changes coming Liturgically starting this last Sunday in August, so maybe by the time you read this we will have had our first Youth Service. Normally the Youth Service will be the first Sunday of the month Fall through Spring. The young people will act in the reader's role, the hymns will be more "kid friendly", we will be changing the confession to something more symbolic rather than just speaking the BCP words and we'll be singing more. In addition in all services we will be celebrating Birthdays, Anniversaries and Travel plans. Each Sunday after the Announcements we will pray for those who are celebrating milestones and for those who will be traveling. Many in our congregation are semi-seasonal attendees and it will be nice to acknowledge their going out and their coming in. We will be keeping our Rite 1 services the first and third Sundays at 8:00 AM but inserting the additional prayers.

Look for outreach from your Vestry. Over the next few weeks each of the Vestry members will be reaching out to groups of you to solicit feedback on our strategic plan. At house meetings or via email you will be asked for your input as to where you see us going, what ministries are important for us as a congregation and what is important focus of our community. The Vestry will take your feedback and put forth a vision statement that we will use to guide our decision making and direction over the next several years. This is your chance to give your input. We will roll out the plan this Winter and vote on it at our annual meeting. I envision this something we will do every three to five years to make sure we stay on track and in touch with where you see us going.

Summer is a time when many churches, especially here in the Northeast, see a decline in attendance. It seems as though we at Christ Church are seeing that decline not just in the Summer but throughout the year. It is not that people have walked away for I see you at events and helping out just not as often on Sunday mornings. I know lives are full with many important things. I know too you feel connected to the church because you

pledge and volunteer. It's just that we miss you. When the service is attended by 40 or so people the liturgy seems to come alive without us actually changing anything. On top of this there have been some people who have left and don't seem to be coming at all. I would like to ask if you'd be willing to start an outreach ministry to those who have been missing from our pews. I know they are your friends. Their presence enriches our worship and will long after I may have moved on so I am asking you to do this for your community. Sometimes it's hard to face the clergy person if you haven't seen them in a while. They forget that I won't judge them for not coming. I need your help reaching out to our intermittent and absent friends. I didn't plan the article in the newsletter about "Why go to Church" but it does apply.

In a similar vein please take note of the Treasurer's report. You will notice that the amount we are spending is greater than the amount we are taking in. This is distressing. It reflects lower Sunday attendance. It doesn't reflect that some of us have prepaid our yearly pledges. We have been able to make capital repairs and fixes because of the generosity of the Marjorie Scott ongoing gifts which are for non-operating expenses. Paying our month to month operating bills has been a continual juggle. We are looking for ways to decrease our expenditures, however with 40% of the money covering keeping the lights on and the other money just barely covering payroll, we are living collection plate to collection plate. I know most of you are pledging and giving generously, but I need to point out that unless we can increase real income, not just draw down on dwindling endowments, things will have to change in ways none of us will be happy with. We have the additional monies from new endowments but this just keeps our heads above water as we try to reduce our other endowment draws to sustainable levels. We are grateful when people step up to pay an oil bill or elevator repair but our pledging income and operating expenses remain out of whack. The stewardship season is upon us and I would like to remind all of us that stewardship is not just about money, although we need to pay the rent. It is about sustaining a community in size, in outreach, in ministry. What makes this congregation a meaningful viable place to and for you can be shared, needs to be shared. It's a job for all of us.

I've heard it said and I agree this thing we have as a church is not about numbers of people showing up on Sundays it is about the impact those people have in the world and in people's lives. We will never be a Mega-Church nor would we want to be. We are a seed church, a guiding light community. We touch others by who we are and what we do. We need to find ways to reach that space where we can continue, not continually grow but to sustain and blossom. We have shown time and again during my short tenure the grit and determination of the Spirit. We have but a few loaves, a fish or two. If we don't share from what we have and who we are that is all we will ever have. The boy in the parable didn't end up with 12 baskets full because he kept his lunch to himself. Reach out to the Spirit in your neighbor. This coming harvest season reach out and say come join us at our table. Come sing the Spirit's hymn.

Feel free to offer me feedback and suggestions. Remember though that we all have ideas and what we are lacking sometimes is the hands to make them all happen. Think about how you'd respond to me giving you permission to implement the ideas you might offer because I probably will suggest you do just that.

May Almighty God bless and keep you – in Jesus name I pray.

Deacon Matters



I have attended the ordinations of friends and colleagues as they enter the ministry of a Deacon in God's church. There have been many ordination sermons about the work of deacons as the bridge between the world and the church, the nudge that keeps the church looking out into the community in which it worships, the servant-leader helping to inspire new ministries within a congregation. I have heard many sermons about the work of deacons, some about the life and call of an individual deacon, but few about what calls us to and sustains us in our ministry. That is understandable since the ministry of a deacon is so bound by our own unique personalities, gifts, and dreams for the world. What we as deacons share is our Deacon's heart and the certainty that heart to heart is the way we serve.

If there was time to share my personal stories of call in this writing, I am sure I could share how blessed and deeply moved I am by the depth and breadth of my relationship with God through Jesus Christ. I came to narrate my story with ease by writing it over and over for the many people who discerned my call with me and guided me toward ordination. I felt God's calling for a period of about 12 years but did not listen. It wasn't until Bishop Clarence Coleridge sat me down and said, "Diane, you are a deacon."

My heart has been and has grown larger in the realm of servant ministry. I know this is where God wants me to be and I find great joy in that.

I imagine that every deacon has a favorite passage from scripture that binds us to our call to ministry. I also think there are three that resonate within a deacon's heart.

Acts 6, the story of the calling of the first deacons certainly defines our servanthood. **Isaiah 6**, "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, whom shall I send and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" **John 21**, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, do you love me? And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep."

In each of these favorite passages, we who answer are sent. In Acts, we are charged with the care of those in the community who are overlooked, neglected. In Isaiah, we respond, "Send me!" In John, we are sent where we may not wish to go to do what we may not wish to do. A deacon's life is not settled. In fact, as soon as we are settled, we are sent again! But being unsettled is a gift that forces us to rely upon God and the miracle is that wherever we are, God is - and we build community wherever we are by inviting and empowering others to trust God and share their gifts for ministry.

Let's step back for a moment to remember the Story of John at his birth. Elizabeth is his mother and Zechariah, his father. Elizabeth was of such advanced age that pregnancy had long ceased to be a hope for her. Zechariah, when he learned that after so many years of hoping, his wife was indeed pregnant, did not believe it - for his disbelief, God made Zechariah mute. He did not speak again until the birth of his son. Imagine a child with that story to tell! Imagine the impact on the child of God's intervention in his very birth. Would he not expect God to speak plainly in his life? Would he not expect to do God's work? Would he not find it impossible to live a quiet, unimaginable life with God's spirit burning in and through him, desperate to be shared with the world? No wonder John the Baptist seemed crazy! He was crazy for God.

As a deacon, we all have stories to tell about God's call on our lives, about our desire to do God's work, and

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we do find it impossible to live quiet, unimaginable lives with God's spirit burning. My birth story and those of other deacons may not be so miraculous as John the Baptist's, but deacons do have amazing stories to tell about God's call in our lives, about our desire to do God's work – and we do find it impossible to live quiet, unimaginable lives with God's spirit burning in and through us. We bring God's love to those who have been forgotten or we have forgotten – we hope when others have lost hope – we teach, we pray, we love, we challenge, and we live on the bridge between church and the world – and like Jon the Baptist, tell the story of a Savior who will change everything.

God is at home in our deacon's heart. I have come to understand that when I say "Yes" without thinking, it is God's Holy Spirit and my deacon's heart at work in me. When I said "Yes" to the Executive Committee of the Greater Bridgeport Deanery to become the Deanery Missioner a short two plus years ago, I had no idea what that entailed. It was up to me to figure it out and how to engage our deanery communities of faith. If I had waited to think, I might have missed one of the most Diaconal of all the ministries to which I am called. For me it was the excitement to begin, the ability to imagine and the calm assurance that God had already said "Yes" for me.

And the twelve called together the whole community and said, "Select from among yourselves seven full of the spirit and of wisdom. Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" We are God's messengers, God's comforters, God's crazy, imaginative heralds of what might be. **God dreams and Deacon's answer!**

Deacon Diane

The following was sent to Deacon Diane by fellow parishioner Nancy Garofolo. Deacon Diane asked to have it shared with the congregation.

WHY GO TO CHURCH?

An answer to 'Why go to church?' If you're spiritually alive, you're going to love this! If you're spiritually dead, you won't want to read it. If you're spiritually curious, there is still hope! A churchgoer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. 'I've gone for 30 years now,' he wrote, 'and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons, but for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. So, I think I'm wasting my time and the priests are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all.'

This started a real controversy in the 'Letters to the Editor' column. Much to the delight of the editor, it went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher:

'I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But, for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of those meals. But I do know this: They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!'

When you are DOWN to nothing, God is UP to something! Faith sees the invisible, believes the incredible and receives the impossible! Thank God for our physical and our spiritual nourishment!



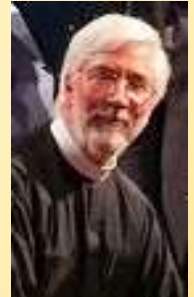
